## PHIL 1025: Contemporary Moral Issues

### **Course Description & Objectives**

This course offers a critical examination of controversial moral issues faced by society today. In this course, we will explore three main topics of interest in contemporary moral debates. First, we will discuss socio-political moral issues including the morality of the death penalty and the effects of racism within the American criminal justice system. The second topic, involving moral issues related to health and the nature of humanity, will include discussions of topics like the morality of abortion, opting-out of immunization, and intentional genetic modification. Finally, we will discuss moral issues related to recent technological advancements including the effects of automation and the ethics of artificial intelligence. Students will learn how to apply basic principles and major theories of modern ethics to these issues, become acquainted with some competing perspectives on the issues, and learn to develop and strengthen their own arguments to support their positions on these issues.

As this is an introductory philosophy course, there are no prerequisites and students are not expected to have any prior experience with philosophy. However, this does not mean that it will be exceptionally easy (though it should not be exceptionally difficult either). Some of the readings for this class may seem technical if you are not accustomed to reading philosophy and they may prove difficult to fully understand with a single read-through. While I expect everyone to make an attempt at fully working through the texts on their own, I will also guide you through each of the readings.

Assignments —

<u>Weekly Assignments</u> (12 total – 50 points each, 600 points total) — Most weeks, students will be assigned some form of weekly assignment. These weekly assignments will cover materials assigned during the week in which they are released. They will be released along with the module that they belong to each week and will be due by 5PM that Sunday. These assignments may include multiple choice questions or short written response questions – each will include detailed instructions.

<u>Midterm Writing Assignment</u> (200 points) — The midterm assignment will be a collection of short essay questions related to issues discussed in the first half of the semester. Students will choose to respond to four out of five available prompts. The total assignment should be approximately 4 pages long. More details about writing philosophical papers and the assignment in particular will be released shortly before the midterm is assigned.

<u>Final Writing Assignment</u> (200 points) — The final writing assignment will be a collection of short essay questions related to issues discussed in the second half of the semester. Students will choose to respond to four out of five available prompts. The total assignment should be approximately 4 pages long. More

details about writing philosophical papers and the assignment in particular will be released shortly before the final is assigned.
